OFSAA Assistant Director's Message

THE BENEFITS OF HOSTING

For over 75 years, the Ontario Federation of School Athletic Associations (OFSAA) has been at the forefront of high school athletics, promoting leadership, sportsmanship, and community engagement. OFSAA provides student-athletes with the opportunity to compete at a provincial level. At the same time, the schools and communities that host these events enjoy lasting and rewarding benefits that go well beyond the final game.

In recent years, OFSAA has struggled to find hosts for specific sports, putting a strain on experienced convenors who are asked to host annually. I want to highlight how hosting an OFSAA event can benefit your school and community.

One of the most immediate and rewarding aspects of hosting an OFSAA event is the enormous sense of pride it creates. When students rally behind their teams, staff lead in planning roles, and alumni return to help, school spirit thrives. Bringing together families, coaches, and students from across Ontario offers host communities and schools an opportunity to showcase their spirit, hospitality, and pride.

The boost to the local economy is often an overlooked advantage. Communities see a notable increase in visitors from teams traveling across Ontario. Local businesses see increased sales, restaurants become busier, and hotels fill up. Hosting OFSAA may be one of the year's most significant occasions for many smaller towns.

The host association also benefits from an additional entry in the festival or championship, allowing local teams to compete at the provincial level, even if they did not qualify through the Association Championships. This incentive appeals to programs or areas with a strong tradition in a particular sport. Attending an OFSAA event presents a fantastic opportunity

to gain experience, build confidence, and pave the way for future success.

We always remind our convenors that the primary goal of hosting an OFSAA event isn't to turn a profit. Instead, the focus should be on delivering a high-quality experience while meeting budget constraints. OFSAA has sponsorship agreements with equipment providers for many sports, allowing the host school to retain equipment as part of the event's legacy. In some cases, equipment upgrades can be incorporated into the event budget, although we generally expect that many essentials are already in place. With community sponsor support, some events can even offset costs and provide additional assistance to their school's athletic program.

Hosting an OFSAA event is about more than just the competition—it's a chance to showcase what makes your school and community unique, build connections, and develop a sense of pride that remains long after the event concludes. So, the next time the opportunity arises, don't hesitate. Because when your community hosts OFSAA, everyone wins.

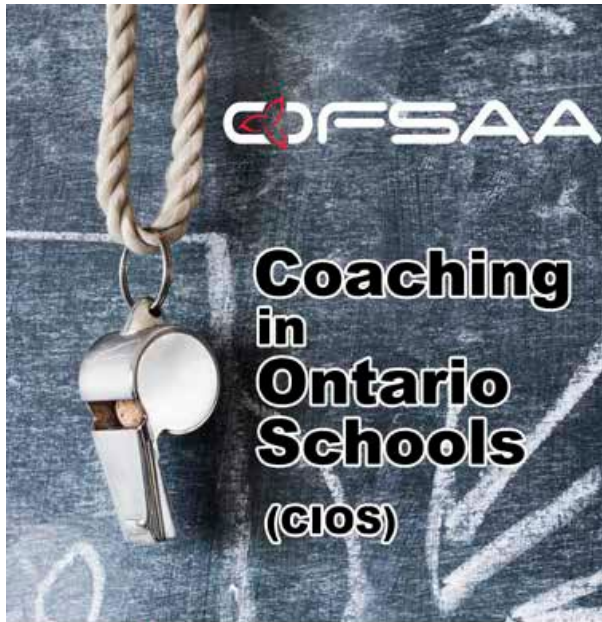

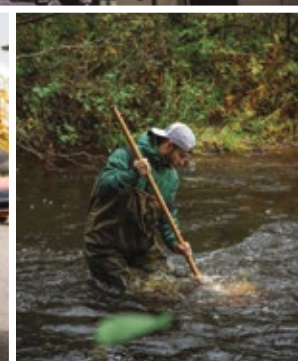
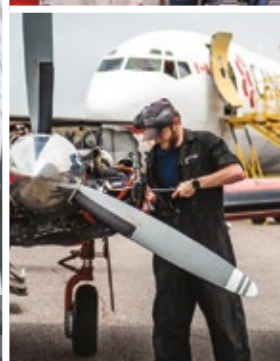

THE IMPRINT OF OFSAA TRY DAY!

As a former student from Mackenzie Community School in Deep River (EOSSAA), I was one of the student leaders who introduced cricket to our school as part of OFSAA Try Day in 2022. Now three years later, I wanted to share how impactful that opportunity was for me and my peers, and express how grateful I am for the funding OFSAA was able to provide.

As MCS is a small rural school, extra funding, new equipment, and exciting learning opportunities are not always easy to come by. When applying for Try Day in 2022, cricket was recommended, and though I had never played the sport, we decided to give it a go. With minimal knowledge and a few peers who were familiar with cricket, we were able to successfully introduce the sport to over 200 students throughout the day. I was thankful for the opportunity to try my hand at a new sport, as well as to see so many other students learning, laughing, and finding new skills. The part of this day that truly resonates with me to this day was the joy of students who had a love for cricket being able to share the sport with their friends, when a former lack of equipment prevented them from doing so. It makes me incredibly happy to see this equipment still being used in gym classes at MCS, and the dedication from teachers to learn how to teach cricket to their students. I'd say that cricket equipment went a long way in promoting the sport!

This day was very special to me back in 2022, but it is even more special to me now today. I had the incredible opportunity to participate in the very first OCR (Ontario College Recreation) women's cricket tournament as a member of Cambrian College's team (Sudbury). When I saw that the college was hosting tryouts for the team, I instantly knew I wanted to join. I had never played a proper match before, but the joy I had playing in high school was

still there, and I was so excited to play again. I learned as much as I could within the week, and successfully made the team. My teammates were shocked to hear that the extent of my cricket experience was that one OFSAA Try Day, but it was the happiness I felt playing the game that made me show up, far beyond the skill I had. Our team managed to reach the finals of the tournament, and success was seen from every college, with it looking like women's cricket will be sticking around for OCR.

I play on three varsity teams at Cambrian - soccer, badminton, and cross-country running - but I'm being completely honest when I say that cricket has become my favourite by far. Without the funding from OFSAA Try Day and the opportunity to introduce cricket to our school, I'd have never considered playing college cricket. But just that one day of enjoying myself in learning a new sport and sharing it with others was enough to keep me engaged and wanting more. I am so incredibly thankful for the support of OFSAA, both for the funding that gave me my start in cricket, but also for the competition I was able to participate in all other sports, that also led me to a successful three-sport college career.

If I didn't realize how impactful introducing new and non-traditional sports to youth was back in 2022, I absolutely do now today. I just wanted to let everyone know how unique and important the OFSAA Try Day program is, and how appreciative I am of its success. Thank you for giving me and so many others opportunity to excel in places we never thought we'd be.

Code Of Conduct For Spectators For OFSAA Events

Any OFSAA event must attempt to achieve a standard of organizational and educational excellence which will serve to place it beyond reproach in either area. OFSAA is committed to providing a safe and inclusive environment that is free of discrimination and harassment. Everyone is welcome and should expect to help promote an environment where people are treated in a courteous, professional, considerate and respectful manner by all spectators, staff and participants.

The following points address conduct that is inconsistent with OFSAA's mission, goals and values and detracts from the overall OFSAA experience and is prohibited at all OFSAA events:

- Behaviour that is unruly, disruptive, threatening or violent in nature, including verbal or physical harassment of officials, student-athletes, teacher-coaches, staff or other spectators
- Conduct that is illegal
- Conduct that results in damage to the facility or other personal property
- Displaying signs, symbols, images (including those associated with hate based organizations), using language or making gestures that are threatening, abusive, or discriminatory, including on the basis of race, ethnicity, national origin, religion, gender, gender identity, ability, and/or sexual orientation
- Interfering with the competition, including; entering the field of play, throwing objects of any kind, incidents of distraction (e.g. artificial noisemakers, noise during a serve or foul shot, etc.)
- Throwing objects of any kind, or entering the field of play
- Failing to follow requests from staff regarding event operations, policies and emergency response procedures
- Consumption or being under the influence of any alcoholic beverage or drugs, other than medication prescribed by a medical doctor, whether of legal age or not, at any time during an OFSAA event
- Any disruptive, harmful or disorderly behaviour or any act which, in the opinion of the convenor or OFSAA representative, presents a risk to the safety of other individuals, interferes with the competition or otherwise targets other spectators or other spectators enjoyment of the competition.

Selecting just two females and two male winners from the over 200 submissions is a difficult task, but these four individuals stood out for their commitment to OFSAA's values of leadership, equity, respect and sportsmanship. Each winner will receive a \$500 grant from Baron Rings, a ring and a commemorative plaque to recognize this outstanding achievement.



Charlotte (Char) Ailey

Charlotte "Char" Ailey is an exceptional Grade 12 student-athlete whose inclusive leadership, strong moral character, and extensive contributions to both school and community make her a deserving recipient of the OFSAA Character

Athlete Award. Char consistently demonstrates the values of leadership, commitment, respect, equity, and growth—both in sport and in life.

Throughout her time at Superior Collegiate & Vocational Institute (NWOSSAA), Char has been a driving force in athletics. A dedicated multi-sport athlete, she has represented her school in cross-country running, cross-country skiing, mountain biking, basketball, soccer, track and field, and curling. She has qualified for OFSAA in cross-country every year and earned recognition through MVP titles, All-Star selections, Coaches Awards, and Academic-Athletic achievement. As team captain of the cross-country running, skiing, and mountain biking teams, she is known for her supportive presence and inclusive leadership—leading warmups, orienting new athletes to trails, and uplifting teammates with kindness and encouragement.

Char's resilience was on full display in Grade 10 when a cancelled flight to OFSAA cross-country meant her team had to drive 16 hours overnight. Despite the circumstances, she stayed positive, rallied her teammates, and placed an impressive 25th. This unwavering optimism and determination is a hallmark of Char's leadership.

Beyond competition, Char is deeply committed to mentorship

and empowerment, especially for girls and marginalized youth. As a Women on Skis Group Leader and Fast and Female volunteer, she has led over 50 young participants through skill stations, games, and team-building activities. She's a regular volunteer with the Black Sheep Mountain Biking Club, teaches young skiers through the Jackrabbit program, and serves on the NWOSSAA Sub Executive Council, helping shape regional sport policy with an equity-focused lens.

Char's influence also extends far beyond athletics. She is a Fridays for Future climate activist, co-led an art show fundraiser that raised \$1,855 for student support initiatives, and volunteers at a wide range of school and community events, including the Iftar Celebration, Mean Girls play, Gryphon Gala concert, SCVI Open House, and Health Care Vitals booth. Her creativity and advocacy come together in Superior Senses, the student wellness company she founded, focused on mental health and holistic well-being.

A student in the Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM) Health Care program, Char has shown deep commitment to learning and service. Even after a Spring 2024 injury, she continued to show up for her track and mountain biking teams—leading warmups with her voice and cheering loudly from the sidelines.

Char also recently exhibited her artwork in a professional gallery show, showing her dedication to growth in all areas of her life. She treats everyone with respect—whether welcoming newcomers to school teams, supporting exchange students, or creating spaces where everyone feels valued.

Char Ailey represents the best of student sport: a compassionate leader, tireless volunteer, accomplished athlete, and advocate for positive change. Her legacy is one of kindness, inclusion, and impact. She is a true role model, and an ideal recipient of the OFSAA Character Athlete Award.



ALEXA CORMIER

Alexa is a remarkable grade 12 Honour Roll student whose high school journey has been defined by excellence in athletics, academics, and community leadership. A dedicated athlete, she has balanced a demanding training schedule with an

unwavering commitment to academic success and service to others, consistently demonstrating compassion, initiative, and resilience.

Throughout her time at Christ the King Catholic Secondary School (GHAC), Alexa has competed at a high level in swimming, soccer, track and field, and rugby, while also excelling in taekwondo outside of school. A vital member of the school's swim team, Alexa has played a pivotal role in the growth of the program, recruiting and mentoring new athletes and helping many of them find success at regional and provincial levels. KABIR NIJER

Kabir Nijjer is an outstanding scholar, athlete, and leader whose impact spans academics, athletics, entrepreneurship and community engagement. Arriving at Central Peel Secondary School (ROPSSAA) during the post-COVID transition, Kabir began as a

quiet, undersized Grade 9 student with no formal volleyball experience. Today, he graduates as a transformative force at CPSS, having led initiatives that shaped the culture of his school and extended far beyond it.

Athletically, Kabir has redefined what’s possible for a public school program. After being cut from his middle school volleyball team, he joined CPSS’s junior squad and, through relentless work, became captain of the senior team. Under his leadership, the program rose from obscurity to win its first-ever Tier 1 regional championship—ending a 60-year drought and earning a berth at OFSAA. He also captains the varsity soccer team and contributes to track and field, baseball, badminton, and ball hockey, earning Junior Athlete of the Year and nomination for Senior Athlete of the Year.

Kabir's leadership extends throughout the school. He currently serves as Vice-President of the Griffins Athletic Council, Co-President of the CPSS STEM Fellowship, and General Executive of the Financial Leadership Association. He's also an executive with STEAM IC, a Link Crew Leader, and has represented CPSS at both DECA and FBLA, winning international and national awards. A passionate debater, Kabir is an eight-time award-winning Model UN delegate and member of the school's Mock Trial and Bail program.

His contributions reach far beyond school walls. As Senior Director of Finance for the Canadian Young Investor Society, he mentors high school students across Canada on financial literacy and entrepreneurship. He is the Curriculum Officer for the Good Eats Project, where he helps students create social enterprise models that benefit local food banks. He also founded the Canadian Youth Diplomatic Initiative, empowering students to engage in international policy dialogue, and serves as Vice-President of the Markham FBLC and Director of Toronto Model United Nations.

Kabir has also gained professional experience typically reserved for university students. He completed a rotational finance internship with ZuraBio and interned at TD Bank's Global Markets division, trading real assets and commodities—a rare achievement for a high school student.

Academically, Kabir is one of the top-performing students at CPSS. A passionate problem-solver, he combines his love of sports and business to develop real-world solutions. Most recently, he won first place at DECA Provincials for "Swiftsol," a product he invented to clean dust from the tongue of shoes—an idea born from a slip during volleyball practice. His innovation and strategic thinking earned him a spot at the DECA Internationals, the largest high school business competition in North America.

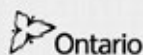
